

challenging. "Even if I'm
miserable, the addiction's gotta
go," he said. After a month of being
at Waterfront, Dylan gave his life
to Christ. Now he has completed
the recovery program, obtained
his driver's license, established
accountability, and is now striving
toward securing permanent
housing.



Recovery Program Restructure

In 2022, Waterfront's recovery program was restructured to be a nine-month program with three, three-month phases. During each phase, men are led through a Biblically-based curriculum. The recovery program focuses on long-term sustainability found in community and accountability. Men are already seeing great success in the new structure, which includes a career development and transition phase. In 2022, 89 men were enrolled in Waterfront's recovery program.

Recycling & Donations

At Waterfront, nothing goes to waste. Any items that cannot be sold at any of our seven thrift stores are recycled at the Recycling and Distribution Center. In 2022, Waterfront recycled over 2.3 million pounds of product through the Recycling and Distribution Center. The team at the RDC collected 11,464 donation pickups, and they drove 196,000 miles picking up these donations across the Gulf Coast.


